Programme-specific section:

Master's Programme: Philosophy (60 EC)

These Course and Examination Regulations (henceforth OER) have been drawn up in accordance with the Higher Education and Research Act [*Wet op het hoger onderwijs en wetenschappelijk onderzoek*; WHW] (henceforth the Act) and the following Leiden University regulations:

- the Leiden Register of Study Programmes Framework Document;
- the Academic Calendar;
- the Regulations for Student Registration, Tuition Fees and Examination Fees;
- the Regulations for Admission to Master's Programmes.

Pursuant to Article 7.14 of the Act, the Faculty Board regularly evaluates the Course and Examination Regulations and considers, for the purpose of monitoring and adjusting the study load, how much time it takes students to comply. In accordance with Article 9.18 of the Act, the departmental committee is assigned the task of annually assessing the implementation of the OER.

These Course and Examination Regulations consist of two sections:

- a faculty section that is the same for all programmes and
- a section that contains information that is specific to a particular programme, what is known as the programme-specific section of the Course and Examination Regulations.

In the text below the relevant articles will refer to this section.

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Chapter 2 Description of the Programme

Article 2.1 Objectives of the programme

The programme has the following objectives:

1. to enable students to acquire academic knowledge, understanding and skills, and train them in the use of scientific methods in the field of philosophy;
2. to enable students to develop the following academic and professional skills:
 - independent academic reasoning and conduct,
 - the ability to analyse complex problems,
 - the ability to clearly report academic results, both in writing and orally;
3. to prepare students for an academic career and further education;
4. to prepare students for a career outside academia.

Article 2.2 Specialisations

The programme has the following specialisations:

- Ethics and Politics (last possible commencement date is 1 February 2020)
- History and Philosophy of the Sciences (last possible commencement date is 1 February 2020)
- Philosophical Anthropology and Philosophy of Culture (last possible commencement date is 1 February 2020)
- Philosophical Perspectives on Politics and the Economy

In 2020-2021 the programme will have the following specialisations:

- Global and Comparative Philosophy
- Modern European Philosophy
- Moral and Political Philosophy
- Philosophical Perspectives on Politics and the Economy
- Philosophy of Knowledge

Article 2.3 Learning outcomes

Graduates of the programme have attained the following learning outcomes, listed according to the Dublin descriptors:

1. Knowledge and understanding
 - a. knowledge and understanding in the field of systematic philosophy and its history, as well as of developments in contemporary philosophy, that are based on the bachelor's programme, surpass the level of the latter, and form the basis of the independent development and application of original ideas, understanding and analyses;
 - b. knowledge and understanding of recent discussions in the field of their specialisation.
2. Applying knowledge and understanding

the ability, on the basis of the knowledge and understanding of philosophy they have acquired, to contribute to current discussions in philosophy and related areas.
3. Judgement
 - a. the ability, on the basis of the sound knowledge of philosophy acquired during the programme, to analyse complex philosophical problems;
 - b. the ability to judge the reliability of different kinds of sources;

- c. the ability to form judgements based on different kinds of sources;
 - d. a realistic view of the reliability of their conclusions;
 - e. the ability to integrate different approaches to philosophical questions and compare these with each other.
4. Communication
- a. the ability to give a clear presentation of philosophical problems, ideas, theories, interpretations and arguments, for specialist audiences as well as for a general audience;
 - b. the ability to write philosophical papers at an academic level.
5. Learning skills
- the possession of learning skills that allow graduates to continue their study of philosophy and to formulate a research proposal for a PhD.

Article 2.5 Study load

The programme has a study load of 60 credits.

Article 2.8 Language of instruction

2.8.1. In compliance with the Code of Conduct on the Language of Instruction¹ the language of instruction and examination of the programme is English. Students are expected to have an adequate command of the language of instruction of the programme.

2.8.2. Contrary to Article 2.8.1, in individual cases the Board of Examiners can permit the student to write the final thesis in another language, in accordance with the Guideline on Language Policy.²

Chapter 3 Curriculum

Article 3.1 Compulsory components

3.1.1 The programme includes compulsory components worth a total study load of 60 credits. These compulsory components include the set components from which a student is obliged to choose.

4.3.7 The final part of the completion and assessment of the MA thesis is the oral MA examination, which consists of an interview with the candidate on the subject of the thesis conducted by a graduation committee, appointed by the Board of Examiners. The candidate's performance during the interview will be taken into account for the determination of the final grade of the thesis.

Chapter 5 Admission to the Programme

Article 5.2 Admission to the programme

Admission per 2019-2020

5.2.1 Pursuant to Article 7.30b (1) of the Act holders of (one of) the following degrees may be admitted to (the indicated specialisation(s) of) the programme and one of its specialisations, or who have successfully completed the following prescribed pre-master's/bridging programme:

- a. a bachelor's degree from a Dutch research university (in the specialisation) in:

- b. not applicable.
c. a prescribed pre-master's/bridging programme pursuant to article 5.4.1. The prescribed pre-masters/bridging programme must be completed within the nominal duration plus one semester (in case of a pre-master's/bridging programme of 30 EC or less) or plus one study year (in case of a pre-master's/bridging programme of more than 30 EC).

5.2.2 The Faculty Board may, on request, grant admission to (one or more of the specialisations of) the programme to applicants who do not meet the requirements as specified in 5.2.1, points a and b, but who can demonstrate to the satisfaction of the Faculty Board that they possess a level of knowledge, understanding and skills equal to that of holders of a degree specified in 5.2.1, points a and b possibly under further conditions.

To be considered as holding a degree equal to the one specified in 5.2.1a, applicants must meet the following requirements:

- a bachelor's degree from a research university, equivalent to the level of a Dutch academic Bachelor's degree, or demonstrate to meet the requirements for such a degree, including the General Academic Skills listed in Appendix B, and
- the ability to formulate a clear philosophical research question, to develop and formulate a critical view on that question, and to support this view by means of argument and analysis, to be determined on the basis of a writing sample.

In addition, the applicant must also meet the following specific requirements per specialisation:

- History and Philosophy of the Sciences:
 - relevant knowledge of theoretical philosophy and its history, equivalent to the knowledge obtained in the pre-master's programme for History and Philosophy of the Sciences, as specified in Article 5.4;
- Ethics and Politics:
 - relevant knowledge of ethics and political philosophy and their history, equivalent to the knowledge obtained in the pre-master's programme for Ethics and Politics, as specified in Article 5.4;
- Philosophical Anthropology and Philosophy of Culture:

- relevant knowledge of philosophical anthropology and philosophy of culture and their history, equivalent to the knowledge obtained in the pre-master's programme for Philosophical Anthropology and Philosophy of Culture, as specified in Article 5.4;
- Philosophical Perspectives on Politics and the Economy
 - relevant knowledge of contemporary ethics, political philosophy and/or political theory, equivalent to the knowledge obtained in the pre-master's programme for Philosophical Perspectives on Politics and the Economy, as specified in Article 5.4.

Applicants with a bachelor's degree from a Dutch research university in International Studies who have completed courses in philosophy with a total course load of at least 35 ECTS credits are considered to have fulfilled all entry requirements for *Philosophical Perspectives on Politics and the Economy*.

Applicants with a bachelor's degree from a Dutch research university in Liberal Arts and Sciences: Global Challenges and who completed courses in philosophy with a total course load of at least 35 credits are admitted to *Philosophical Perspectives on Politics and the Economy* on the basis of Article 5.3. Depending on the contents of the completed courses, the Board of Admissions will determine an additional catch-up programme as referred to in Article 5.3.3.

Applicants who are in possession of a bachelor's degree in Political Science or in Public Administration from a Dutch research university are admitted to *Philosophical Perspectives on Politics and the Economy* on the basis of Article 5.3. The Board of Admissions has determined a catch-up programme, as referred to in Article 5.3.3, for 15 ECTS credits of deficiencies, consisting of the following bachelor's courses: Academic Skills Philosophy I (5 EC), Ethics (5 EC), and Political Philosophy (5 EC).

Applicants as referred to in Article 5.2.1b and Article 5.2.2. are requested to provide the Board of Admissions with information demonstrating that the applicant possesses the same level of knowledge, understanding and skills as holders of a degree as specified in Article 5.2.1a.

5.2.3 Dutch and English languages³

5.2.3.1 As further clarification of Article 2.8 concerning command of the language of instruction, a student who wishes to be admitted to an English-taught master's programme must have one of the following diplomas, or must meet the criteria of:

- an [International Baccalaureate](#) diploma (or other with English A);
- a diploma of secondary or higher education completed in the United States of America, the United Kingdom, Ireland, New Zealand, Australia or Canada (with the exception of French-taught education in Canada);
- a diploma of an English-taught university degree programme completed at a Dutch research university;
- a pre-university education (VWO) diploma.
- a high school (or higher) diploma obtained in an EEA country, where English has been studied up to and including the final year of the programme, and where the level of English can be considered comparable to Dutch VWO (pre-university education), to be determined by SEA (Admissions Office).

- c. a prescribed pre-master’s/bridging programme pursuant to article 5.4.1. The prescribed pre-masters/bridging programme must be completed within the nominal duration plus one semester (in case of a pre-master’s/bridging programme of 30 EC or less) or plus one study year (in case of a pre-master’s/bridging programme of more than 30 EC).

5.2.2 The Faculty Board may, on request, grant admission to (one or more of the specialisations of) the programme to applicants who do not meet the requirements as specified in 5.2.1, points a and b, but who can demonstrate to the satisfaction of the Faculty Board that they possess a level of knowledge, understanding and skills equal to that of holders of a degree specified in 5.2.1, points a and b possibly under further conditions.

To be considered as holding a degree equal to the one specified in 5.2.1a, applicants must meet the following requirements:

- a bachelor's degree from a research university, equivalent to the level of a Dutch academic Bachelor's degree, or demonstrate to meet the requirements for such a degree, including the General Academic Skills listed in Appendix B, and
- the ability to formulate a clear philosophical research question, to develop and formulate a critical view on that question, and to support this view by means of argument and analysis, to be determined on the basis of a writing sample.

In addition, the applicant must also meet the following specific requirements per specialisation:

- Global and Comparative Philosophy:
 - relevant knowledge of Western and non-Western traditions in philosophy and their history, equivalent to the knowledge obtained in the pre-master's programme for Global and Comparative Philosophy, as specified in Article 5.4;
- Modern European Philosophy:
 - relevant knowledge of the history of Western philosophy, especially the German and French traditions of the 19th and 20th centuries, equivalent to the knowledge obtained in the pre-master's programme for Modern European Philosophy, as specified in Article 5.4;
- Moral and Political Philosophy:
 - relevant knowledge of ethics and political philosophy and their history, equivalent to the knowledge obtained in the pre-master's programme for Moral and Political Philosophy, as specified in Article 5.4;
- Philosophical Perspectives on Politics and the Economy
 - relevant knowledge of contemporary ethics, political philosophy and/or political theory, equivalent to the knowledge obtained in the pre-master's programme for Philosophical Perspectives on Politics and the Economy, as specified in Article 5.4;
- Philosophy of Knowledge:
 - relevant knowledge of theoretical philosophy and its history, equivalent to the knowledge obtained in the pre-master's programme for Philosophy of Knowledge, as specified in Article 5.4.

Applicants with a bachelor's degree from a Dutch research university in International Studies who have completed courses in philosophy with a total course load of at least 35 ECTS credits are considered to have fulfilled all entry requirements for *Philosophical Perspectives on Politics and the Economy*.

Applicants with a bachelor's degree from a Dutch research university in Liberal Arts and Sciences: Global Challenges and who completed courses in philosophy with a total course load of at least 35 credits are admitted to *Philosophical Perspectives on Politics and the Economy* on the basis of Article 5.3. Depending on the contents of the completed courses, the Board of Admissions will determine an additional catch-up programme as referred to in Article 5.3.3.

Applicants who are in possession of a bachelor's degree in Political Science or in Public Administration from a Dutch research university are admitted to *Philosophical Perspectives on Politics and the Economy* on the basis of Article 5.3. The Board of Admissions has determined a catch-up programme, as referred to in Article 5.3.3, for 15 ECTS credits of deficiencies, consisting of the following bachelor's courses: Academic Skills Philosophy I (5 EC), Ethics (5 EC), and Political Philosophy (5 EC).

Applicants as referred to in Article 5.2.1b and Article 5.2.2. are requested to provide the Board of Admissions with information demonstrating that the applicant possesses the same level of knowledge, understanding and skills as holders of a degree as specified in Article 5.2.1a.

Students who successfully complete this pre-master programme of 60 EC will be admitted to the relevant specialisation of the Master's programme.

The pre-master's programme has a course load of 60 credits and consists of:

- compulsory introductory courses of 5 credits each,
- optional course(s) of 5 credits each (if applicable),
- advanced seminar(s) at third-year BA level of 10 credits each,

as specified in the table below.
