These Course and Examination Regulations (henceforth OER) have been drawn up in accordance with the Higher Education and Research Act [*Wet op het hoger onderwijs en wetenschappelijk onderzoek*; WHW] (henceforth the Act) and the following Leiden University regulations:

- the Leiden Register of Study Programmes Framework Document;
- the Academic Calendar
- the Regulations for Student Registration, Tuition Fees and Examination Fees
- the Regulations for Admission to Master's Programmes

Pursuant to Article 7.14 of the Act, the Faculty Board regularly evaluates the Course and Examination Regulations and considers, for the purpose of monitoring and adjusting the study load, how much time it takes students to comply. In accordance with Article 9.18 of the Act, the departmental committee is assigned the task of annually assessing the implementation of the OER.

These Course and Examination Regulations consist of two sections:

- a faculty section that is the same for all programmes
- a section that contains information that is specific to a particular programme, what is known as the programme-specific section of the Course and Examination Regulations (this document).

In the text below the relevant articles will refer to this section.

Due to the specific joint nature of this degree programme, the following order of precedence applies for students registered for the degree programme at the University of Leiden, insofar stipulations may contradict each other:

- The Dutch higher education act takes precedence over
- The consortium agreement, which takes precedence over
- The Course and Examination Regulations (both Faculty and Programme-specific section)

Appendix D – Programme overview

Article 2.1 Objectives of the Programme

The programme has the following objectives:

1. to enable students to acquire academic knowledge, understanding and skills, and train them in the use of scientific methods in the field of European Politics and Society;
2. to enable students to develop the following academic and professional skills:
 - independent academic reasoning and conduct,
 - the ability to analyse complex problems,
 - the ability to clearly report academic results, both in writing and orally;
3. to prepare students for an academic career and further education;
4. to prepare students for a career outside academia.

The students are able to:

Basic competencies

The students acquire knowledge that provides a basis and an opportunity to be original in the development and/or practice of ideas, especially in a context of design and the practice of research or expert study
The students know how to apply the acquired knowledge and their ability to solve problems in new or less known environments within broader (or multidisciplinary) contexts related to their area of study
The students are able to integrate knowledge and face the complexity of making judgments from information that, incomplete or limited, includes reflections on social and ethical responsibilities linked to the application of their knowledge and judgments

To search, to manage, to analyze, to interpret, to produce and to apply information, including theoretical, acquired on specific issues of European politics and society, from a disciplinary and thematic point of view.
To solve short and long term problems around the study of European politics and society from a critical point of view.
To organize, plan and publicly defend a research plan.
To generate new ideas in research on European politics and society.
To work in a team on joint projects.
To work with ethical values and empathy towards issues related to European politics and society.

Specific competencies

To communicate fluently in English, both orally and in writing, in academic contexts.
To incorporate ethical and human values in the analysis of European politics and society.
To consider a multilevel vision in the analysis of European politics and society taking into account different governments, countries, peoples and other institutions and structures.
To foster the nexus between research and policies (linking academic knowledge with a political and social agenda).

Transversal competencies

To distinguish the central contribution and the approaches of research or study on European politics and society
To identify the main actors and institutions of multilevel governance in European politics and society
To identify a problem of significance in European politics and society, and identify the appropriate methodologies to design a research plan
To understand the basic factors governing discourses and political narratives on European politics and society
To elaborate and defend a research project making use of the existing academic quality criteria
To acquire an open, interdisciplinary and multi-method research mind

Learning outcomes

The student describes in detail the main trends in and knowledge of European politics, culture, history, economics and international relations and their political, social and theoretical bases
The student demonstrates the ability to apply qualitative methods and their variety of techniques, as well as their processes of evaluation and analysis of results, directly related to European politics and society
The student extracts and applies that relevant quantitative information produced by international and national institutions for the analysis of European politics and society
The student designs and plans conceptual and theoretical research, as well as empirical research related to issues of European politics and society

Article 2.5 Study Load

The programme has a study load of 120 credits.

Article 2.8 **Language of Instruction**

2.8.1. Subject to the Code of Conduct on the Language of Instruction¹ the language in which the instruction is given and in which the examinations and final examinations are held is English. Students are expected to have an adequate command of the language of instruction and examination in the programme, in accordance with the requirements stated in Article 5.2.3.

2.8.2. Contrary to Article 2.8.1, in individual cases the Board of Examiners can permit the student to write the final thesis in another language, in accordance with the Guideline on Language Policy.²

Chapter 3 **Curriculum**

Article 3.1 **Compulsory Components**

3.1.1 The programme includes compulsory components worth a total study load of 120 credits. These compulsory components include the set components from which a student is obliged to choose.

Article 4.2 **Obligatory Sequence**

4.2.1 A student is required to have completed a minimum of 45 study credits in the first year before he/she can start with second year components.

Article 5.2 **Admission to the Programme**

5.2.1 Pursuant to Article 7.30b (1) of the Act persons may be granted admission to (the indicated specialisation(s) of) the programme, if they can demonstrate to the satisfaction of the Faculty Board that they meet the following admission requirements, without prejudice to the requirements specified in 5.2.4:

- A bachelor's degree, equivalent to the level of a Dutch academic Bachelor's degree, or demonstrate to meet the requirements for such a degree.
